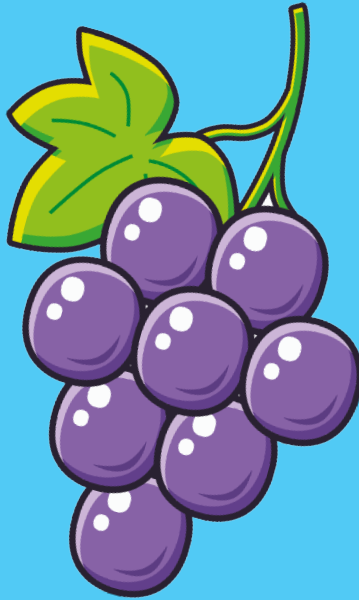

DIET & YOUR EYE HEALTH

Most of us have no idea that what we eat can affect how well we see, however, eye-friendly nutrients found in fruit and vegetables as well as fatty acids derived from fish, nuts and oils can all help protect your sight.

Here are some important foods to help support good eye health.

Cold water fish like sardines, cod and tuna are excellent sources of DHA and omega-3 fatty acids. These provide structural support to cell membranes and can be beneficial for dry eye and general eye health.

Blueberries and grapes contain anthocyanins, which may help with night vision.

Green leafy vegetables such as spinach or kale are rich in carotenoids, especially lutein and zeaxanthin.

Lutein, meso-zeaxanthin and zeaxanthin form a yellow pigment that helps protect the

macula – a tiny yellow spot in your retina – from excessive sun damage by acting as a natural sunblock.

Wholegrains and avocados are rich in Vitamin B. Deficiency in complex B vitamins may increase your risk of cataracts and retinopathy.

Papaya is a good source of beta carotene which can help to prevent ‘free radical’ damage inside the eye.

Eggs are rich in cysteine, sulfur, lecithin, amino acids and lutein. Sulfur may protect the lens of the eye from cataracts.

You should also ensure your alcohol intake is within Department of Health and Social Care recommended limits – no more than 14 units a week.

This is equivalent to six pints of beer or six glasses of wine. You should also have some alcohol free days.
